Indian Startups Raised Usd 6.5 Bn Funding In Q2 2021, 11 New Unicorns Created: Report By Nasscom-Pga Labs

As per an article on 21st August, 2021, Indian startups received \$6.5 billion in funding in April-June quarter, 2021 quarter, which resulted in 11 startups to enter in unicorn club. Despite the pandemic and its aftershocks, Indian start up ecosystem is performing exceptionally well, 23 startups have been added to the unicorn club from 2020 (till date) fundraising has been up by 71% on a quarter-on-quarter. The biggest deal of the quarter was the USD 800 million fund raised by food delivery platform Swiggy, followed by ShareChat (USD 502 million), Byju's (USD 340 million), Pharmeasy (USD 323 million) and Meesho (USD 300 million), as the report said.

Fintech was the most funded sector, accounting for 27 per cent of the total deal value in the reported quarter. This was followed by foodtech (13 per cent), enterprise tech (11 per cent), edtech (10 per cent), and media and entertainment (8 per cent).

Fm Sitharaman Launches National Monetisation Pipeline Scheme, To Monetise Assets Worth Rs 6 Lakh Crore By 2024-25

As per an article on 23rd August, 2021, Finance minister launched NATIONAL MONETISATION PIPLELINE(NMP). This will serve as a roadmap to the ASSET MONETISATION initiative of Modi government. NMP will help improve liquidity to increase expenditure in infrastructure by the government. The Union Budget 2021-22 laid a lot of emphasis on Asset Monetisation as a means to raise innovative and alternative financing for infrastructure, and included a number of key announcements. She added that the pipeline will only include Brownfield assets owned by the government and will not include land assets of the government. India Ranks Second In Chainalysis's 2021 Global Crypto Adoption Index

According an article on 23rd August, 2021, the Chainalysis'2021 Global Crypto Adoption Index India ranks second among 20 countries on the basis of usage of cryptocurrency of the people between July 2020 to June 2021. Vietnam secured the first position in the index and Pakistan is on the third position. Chain analysis Global crypto adoption index revealed that adoption has grown over 800% in the last year especially in emerging market.

China approves three child policies to encourage people to have more children

China's national assembly promotes the three-child policy which aimed to prevent a steep decline in the birth rates of the world's most populous country. Reports claims that the one child policy that was implemented over three decades in China has prevented 400 million births.

The three-child policy came into light after the release of once in a decade census, which shows that China's population grew at the slowest pace to 1.412 billion. The census also revealed that the population of people above 60 ages grew over 264 million.

Google May Invest "Several Thousands Of Crores" Into Airtel

As per an article on 28th August, 2021, Bharti Airtel might get an investment from Google, which can amount the thousands of crores, as per media reports. Both the companies are in advanced stage of discussions and negotiations for the closure of deal.

With Jio and Google are partners, Google might have restrictions to invest in any of its rival companies. Google had invested Rs. 34,000 crores into Jio Platforms.

A large investment from Google will allow the company to smoothly pay off its debt to the government and also keep investing in 4G and 5G network.



Lic Ipo – Govt Selects 10 Banks Including Goldman Sachs, Citigroup To Manage Share Sale

As per an article on 28th August, 2021, the government expects to raise Rs. 80,000 crore-90,000 crore (\$11 bin-12.2 bin) from its stake sale in Life Insurance Corp. (LIC), as a part of its plan to raise Rs. 1.75 lakh crore from a privatization programmed in the current fiscal year ending in March 2022. The government has selected 10 investment banks, including Goldman Sachs, Citigroup, SBI Capital Market, JM Financial Ltd, ICICI Securities and Kotak Mahindra to handle the initial public offering of Life Insurance Corp of India. Sixteen banks, including seven global banks and nine domestic banks had been in the race to handle the IPO.

Why Sex Work Should Be Decriminalized?

The talk around sex work has often been treated as a taboo not only in our own home country, but even in those, which are not so socially backward, usually referred to as "progressive" nations. The moment people think about the life of a sex worker, a lot of dirt, cruel, and vicious thoughts come to our mind. But hardly anyone considers to ask themselves why is it so?

Sex workers are adults who receive money or other forms of compensation in exchange for consensual sexual services. A sex worker can be a female, male, or transgender. In most countries, sex work and the activities associated with it are considered criminal acts.

Sex work is criminalized not only through prohibitions on selling sexual services, but also through laws that prohibit the solicitation of sex, living off of the earnings of sex work, brothel-keeping, or the purchase of sexual services. In addition, many male and transgender sex workers face arrest, prosecution, and harassment because of laws that criminalize same-sex intimate relations. Sex workers are also frequently penalized for non-criminal offenses such as loitering, vagrancy, and impeding the flow of traffic. But sex work is not sexual abuse still, the incidences of those go hand in hand. When an adult makes a decision of their own free will, to exchange sex for money, that is not sexual violence. Whereas, when a sex worker is the victim of a crime, including sexual violence such as when a person exchanges sex for money as a result of coercion, undue influence or experiences violence from a customer, or is a victim of trafficking, these are serious crimes, the police should promptly investigate and prosecute the accused, which seldom happens. Sex workers are often exposed to high levels of violence, abuse, or harm, but this is usually because they are working in a criminalized environment.

Decriminalizing sex work maximizes workers' legal protection and their ability to exercise other key human rights, including just treatment and basic health care. Legal recognition of sex workers and their occupation maximizes their protection, dignity, and equality. This is an important step toward destignatizing sex work. Moreover, any kind of regulations and controls on sex workers and their activities need to be nondiscriminatory and otherwise must comply with international human rights Decriminalization also means sex workers are more likely to live without the stigma, social exclusion, and fear of violence.

One such model to end the exploitation of sex workers was first introduced in Sweden, as the "Nordic Model", which suggests that buying sex is illegal, but does not prosecute the sex worker rather the customer of a sex worker. The Nordic model sees "prostitution" as inherently harmful and coerced hence they aim to end sex work by killing the demand for transactionalsex. Therefore,. Moreover, it facilitates access to healthcare, justice legal or otherwise; reduces the risk of HIV and other sexually transmitted diseases; promotes safe working conditions. It also allows effective responses to trafficking and challenges state control over sex, sexual expression, and sexuality. Like state controls over reproductive rights and sexual acts between consenting

adults and other criminal laws prohibiting sex work attempt to legislate morality and values with scant regard for bodily autonomy.




